- Configure Router:
 - Access the router's admin panel via a web browser (commonly 192.168.1.1).
 - Enter ISP credentials if required and update firmware for optimal performance .
- Test the Connection:
 - Connect a device via Wi-Fi or Ethernet and verify internet access.
 - Run a speed test to ensure the fiber connection is performing as expected .
