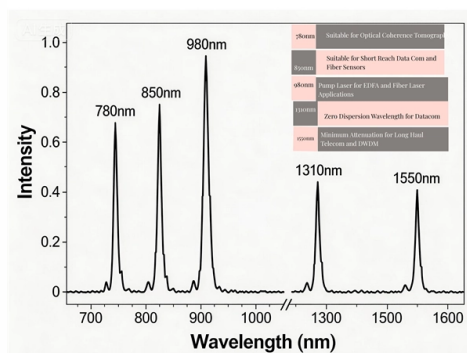


How to connect an optical module to fiber optic cable 6

1. Verify Compatibility Ensure the SFP module matches the fiber type (single-mode or multimode), wavelength, transmission distance, and connector type of your fiber optic cable and network equipment (). 2. Prepare the Components

- Remove dust caps from the SFP module and fiber optic cable connectors.
- Clean the fiber end faces using specialized fiber cleaning tools to prevent signal loss (). 3. Insert the SFP Module

- Align the keyed notch on the SFP module with the slot on the network device (switch, router, or media converter).

 - Insert the connector gently until it clicks or locks in place. If the SFP has a lock tab, engage it to secure the cable ().
5. Verify the Connection
- Check the TX/RX polarity: the transmit (TX) side of one device should connect to the receive (RX) side of the other device.
 - Use a power meter or visual fault locator to confirm proper alignment and signal transmission.
 - Observe the Link LED on the network device to ensure the connection is active ().
6. Secure the Cable
- Route and secure the fiber optic cable to prevent accidental disconnection or bending beyond the recommended radius ().
- Safety and Best Practices
- Handle SFP modules and fiber cables carefully to avoid damage.
 - Avoid touching the fiber end face and always use protective caps when not in use.
 - Be aware of laser safety; most SFP modules are Class 1 and safe under normal operation, but avoid direct eye exposure (). Following these steps ensures a reliable, high-performance optical connection suitable for data centers, enterprise networks, or telecommunications applications.
