Select a junction box that matches the wiring method, environment, and number of wires it will contain. Plastic boxes are suitable for indoor, dry locations, while metal boxes are preferred for commercial or industrial settings due to durability and grounding capabilities. For outdoor or damp areas, use weatherproof boxes with airtight seals to prevent moisture ingress. Ensure the box is large enough to accommodate all conductors, splices, and fittings without overcrowding .

Mounting the Junction Box

- New-work boxes are mounted directly to framing during construction.
- Old-work or remodel boxes are used for finished walls or ceilings.
- Secure the box using screws through designated mounting holes, ensuring it is flush with the wall or ceiling surface.



- For surface-mount boxes, attach directly to the wall or ceiling using appropriate fasteners .

Preparing and Connecting Wires

- Turn off the power at the circuit breaker to ensure safety.
- Strip approximately 3/4 inch (19 mm) of insulation from each wire entering the box.
- Group wires by color (live, neutral, ground) and twist them together using pliers.
- Secure connections with wire nuts or terminal blocks, ensuring no bare wires are exposed.
- Use cable clamps or fittings at entry points to protect wires from abrasion and maintain strain relief .

Finalizing Installation

- Push all connected wires neatly into the box, avoiding sharp bends or overcrowding.
- Attach the cover plate to keep the box accessible for future inspection or maintenance.
- Verify that all splices are secure and insulated, and that the box is firmly mounted to prevent movement .

Safety Considerations

- Always wear protective gloves and eye protection when handling wires.
- Ensure the junction box remains accessible; do not bury it behind walls or ceilings.
- Follow local electrical codes and the National Electrical Code (NEC) for compliance.
- Avoid using a box that is too small, as this can create safety hazards and make future repairs difficult . By following these steps, a junction box can be safely fixed, providing a secure and organized enclosure for electrical connections while minimizing the risk of shock, fire, or damage to wiring.
