1. Router Hardware Limitations Many routers, especially older or budget models, have WAN/LAN ports limited to 10/100 Mbps. Even if your fiber plan supports 1 Gbps, a router with only 100 Mbps ports will cap your speed at 100 Mbps. Check your router's specifications to confirm if it supports Gigabit Ethernet (10/100/1000 Mbps). If not, upgrading to a gigabit-capable router is necessary to fully utilize your fiber connection .
2. Ethernet Cabling Using older cables like Cat 5 can restrict speeds to 100 Mbps. Ensure you are using Cat 5e or Cat 6 cables, which support gigabit speeds. Inspect cables for damage or loose connections, as these can also reduce performance .
3. Router Settings and Configuration Even with a gigabit router, the port negotiation may default to 100 Mbps. Access your router's web interface and check the Ethernet port negotiation speed. Set it to 1000 Mbps Full Duplex if available, then save and reboot the router .
4. Wi-Fi Limitations Wireless connections are often slower than wired connections due to distance, walls, interference, or older Wi-Fi standards. Testing your speed via a wired Ethernet connection can help determine if Wi-Fi is the bottleneck .
5. Device or Network Settings Ensure your computer or device network adapter is configured for gigabit speeds and that drivers are up to date. Some devices may default to lower speeds if auto-negotiation fails .

Troubleshooting Steps

- Run a speed test using a wired connection to your router to confirm actual speeds.
- Restart your router to clear temporary glitches.
- Check router and modem specifications to ensure they support gigabit speeds.
- Inspect and replace Ethernet cables with Cat 5e or Cat 6 if needed.
- Adjust router port settings to 1000 Mbps Full Duplex.
- Update network adapter drivers on your devices. By systematically checking these factors, you can identify whether the slow speed is due to hardware limitations, cabling, configuration, or Wi-Fi interference, and take the appropriate steps to achieve faster fiber performance .
