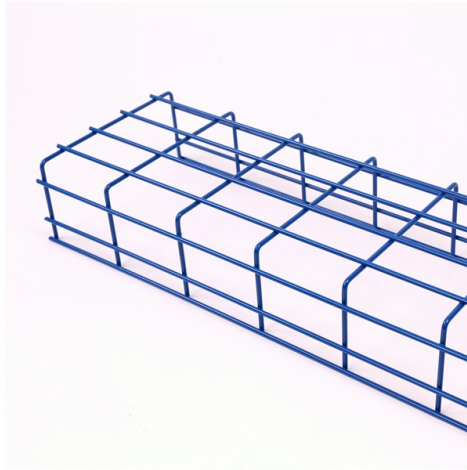


What precautions should be taken when using fiber optic cables

Use a fiber optic power meter to confirm the fiber is dark before inspection, and if using a microscope, ensure it has infrared filters to reduce exposure risk. Always wear safety glasses with side shields to protect against fiber shards or splinters .

Handling Fiber Scraps

Fiber optic cables contain tiny glass strands that can easily penetrate skin or be ingested. Always collect and dispose of fiber scraps in a dedicated, clearly marked container. Avoid dropping scraps on the floor, and never eat or drink near the work area to prevent accidental ingestion. Treat fiber splinters like glass splinters and wear disposable lab aprons or work on black mats to minimize contamination on clothing .

Chemical Precautions

Splicing and termination processes often involve chemicals such as isopropyl alcohol, epoxy, or curing agents. Work in well-ventilated areas, wear gloves, and follow the safety data sheet (SDS) guidelines for each chemical. Avoid skin contact and discontinue use if allergic reactions occur. Keep combustible materials away from fusion splicers and curing ovens .

General Safety Practices

- Wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE), including gloves, safety glasses, and lab aprons .
- Disconnect power sources before working on fiber networks .
- Ensure adequate lighting and a clean workspace to prevent accidents .
- Follow all relevant standards and regulations, such as OSHA, NEC, and NESC, as well as company-specific safety protocols .
- Wash hands thoroughly before touching eyes or handling contact lenses .
